The United States is reaching a tipping point-- where most decision makers understand issues within a sustainability framework, and understand why that perspective is

¤ attractive and

¤ necessary.

➡ The number of governmental and nongovernmental organizations engaged in sustainable development activities has greatly increased since 2002.

□ And we drew these conclusions *before* the economic stimulus legislation was adopted.



Climate change is a major driver

≍ Since 2002, climate change is an important driver for sustainability for many decision makers in corporations, local governments, educational institutions, and religious organizations.

But green jobs are not everywhere

 $\Xi U.S.$ generally moving in the wrong direction on a variety of issues. **¤U.S.** has, for example, an enormous ecological footprint. Although the United States has less than 5 percent of the world's population, our economy accounts for more than 28 percent of the world's production of goods and services. 12

Areas of Greatest Need

 Based on synthesis of contributing authors' recommendations.

Enormous economic development and job creation opportunities—that are not yet realized.

Three key recommendations

A. The United States should systematically reduce its ecological footprint.



 B. The United States government must adopt, as soon as possible, greenhouse gas emission reduction programs that will reduce U.S. emissions to our fair share of safe global emissions.







C. The United States should create more employment opportunities in environmental protection and restoration, and make it easier for unskilled and low-income persons to enter and remain in the workforce.
